Official Opening of the Global Health Talk and Keynote Speech Dr Georg Kippels

Parliamentary State Secretary to the Federal Minister of Health Dr. Georg Kippels is a German lawyer and politician. Born in 1959 in Bedburg, he studied law in Cologne and worked as a lawyer in a family firm. His political career began in 1994 as a member of a city council for the Christian Democratic Party (CDU).

He has been elected for the fourth time as a directly elected member of the German Bundestag for the Rhein-Erft District in North Rhine-Westphalia.

From 2013 to 2025, he served on the Committee on Health and the Committee on Economic Cooperation and Development in the German Bundestag. In 2018, he also joined the newly established Sub-Committee on Global Health as speaker and chair of the CDU/CSU parliamentary group. For the last election period, he was elected chair of the CDU/CSU parliamentary group of the Committee on Health.

He now serves as Parliamentary State Secretary to the Federal Minister of Health.

His political focus lies in improving quality of life through strong healthcare, research and education, economic growth and structural change.

Managing Director of the Global Health Hub Germany and Head of a GIZ project supporting the German Federal Ministry of Health on German global health policy

Corinna Heineke has led the Secretariat of the Global Health Hub Germany since August 2023. Before joining the Hub she worked with GIZ in Berlin and Cambodia for ten years on diverse health-related issues such as access to medicines, local pharmaceutical production, regulatory strengthening, universal health coverage, and Cambodia's COVID19response.

Angela Bähr

Chief Executive Programme Officer of DSW; VENRO – Board Member Angela Bähr, born in Wolfenbüttel in 1964, began her career in development policy in Nicaragua in 1989. As a social scientist with a master's degree in public health, she has been working for more than 20 years on the crosscutting issues of human rights, gender equality and sexual and reproductive health in Germany and abroad. She has extensive institutional experience in the field of German development cooperation, including as an employee of the former GIZ. Here she advised German Development Cooperation on sectoral projects to combat HIV/AIDS.

Angela Bähr has a broad experience in working with partners in Latin America and East Africa.

Since summer 2016, Angela Bähr has been Director of International Projects and Programs, and since 2021 Deputy Managing Director at the German Foundation for World Population (DSW).

Since January 1, 2025, she has been assigned as DSW's Chief Programme Officer taking over the responsibility of DSW in East Africa. Since 2021, Angela Bähr has served as a member of the extended Board of VENRO, where she is responsible for impact orientation and health.

Dr Catharina Böhme

Senior Advisor, WHO

Dr. Boehme is a global health executive with over 20 years of experience at the intersection of strategy, policy, and innovation. She has expanded access to life-saving technologies, shaped international health policy, and mobilized billions in funding for global health priorities. She currently serves as Senior Advisor to the Director-General of the World Health Organization (WHO). As WHO's Assistant Director-General for External Relations and Governance, Dr. Boehme led corporate communications, partnerships, resource mobilization, and the work of the governing boards that set global health direction. She built multi-stakeholder platforms with the private sector, civil society, parliaments, and youth, and launched innovative publicprivate initiatives such as a health impact investment platform. Previously, as Chef de Cabinet to the WHO Director-General during the COVID-19 crisis, she supported leadership decision-making, advised on critical policy issues, and coordinated strategic planning and program delivery across all WHO regions and country offices. She played a key role in driving organizational reform and embedding gender and equity into WHO's work. Before joining WHO, Dr. Boehme was CEO of FIND, where she transformed the organization into a global diagnostics leader operating in over 40 countries. Under her leadership, FIND delivered innovations to over 100 million people and co-led the ACT-Accelerator for COVID-19 testing. Her early clinical and 12 research work in Tanzania, South Africa, and Ghana grounds her commitment to inclusive, sustainable solutions that address health systems challenges.

H. E. Dr Jean Kaseya

Director General of the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (Africa CDC)

Dr. Jean Kaseya was appointed Director-General of the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (Africa-CDC) in February 2023 during the African Union Summit. A Congolese medical doctor with over 25 years of experience in public health, Dr. Kaseya has worked both nationally and internationally, holding key positions in organizations such as UNICEF, Gavi, CHAI, and the WHO. As Director-General, his primary focus is on strengthening health security across Africa through his "New Deal" for Africa CDC. This includes building sustainable financing, improving governance, and enhancing health systems to ensure a more agile response to health crises. Under his leadership, Africa-CDC took proactive steps during the mpox outbreak, declaring it a Public Health Emergency of Continental Concern and facilitating vaccine development and donations. Dr. Kaseya's work has been central to mobilizing resources for pandemic preparedness and building resilient health systems in lowresource settings. His leadership focuses on fostering collaboration, enhancing regional health security, and ensuring sustainable investment in healthcare infrastructure.

After training as an event technology specialist, gained professional experience as a sound technician. Deputy Director-General for European and International Health Policy, Federal Ministry of Health

Paul Zubeil is Deputy Director-General for European and International Health Politics at the German Federal Ministry of Health, where he leads Germany's engagement in both EU health politics and multilateral health cooperation. He advances strategic efforts to strengthen multilateral health governance, reinforce pandemic preparedness, and support the transformation of the global health architecture. With over two decades of experience in international public service, including senior roles at the United Nations, he has worked across regions to support resilient health systems, improve access to essential services, and respond to crossborder health threats. As Germany's representative in the High-Level Panel (HLP) of UNAIDS, he contributes to forward-looking discussions on the institutional future of the Joint Programme and the evolving dynamics of multilateral cooperation. His work is grounded in the conviction that UN reform and inclusive leadership, both globally and regionally, are essential to a resilient, equitable, and more effective international health system.

This is underpinned by a co-development approach bringing together cross-sectoral stakeholders and global health, policy and technology experts from across the globe.

Branwen's experience builds on developing and delivering strategic priorities in global health as funder, consultant and researcher. Prior to taking on the leadership of the GHPL, Branwen consulted for TDR at the World Health Organization (WHO) on implementation research in lowresource settings. As the Interim Head of International Operations at Wellcome in London, UK, she oversaw Wellcome's Africa & Asia Programmes. In her earlier academic career, she led epidemiological research at the Medical Research Council Unit The Gambia / London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine and beyond.

Dr Fahmy Hanna, MD

Technical Focal Point for Mental Health and Psychosocial Support, WHO Dr Fahmy Hanna is a medical doctor and psychiatrist with nearly two decades of global experience in mental health service delivery, emergency response, and systems development. His work spans across WHO, national ministries, NGOs, and donor institutions, with a focus on scaling up mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) in humanitarian and public health emergencies. He worked full time in several conflict-affected countries including Syria and Libya. Since 2014, he has been based at the World Health Organization Headquarters in Geneva, where he serves as a senior technical officer supporting field operations and policy development in crises on-site in more than 30 humanitarian emergencies such as Ukraine, Afghanistan, South Sudan, and Bangladesh. Dr Hanna has led WHO's work on interagency MHPSS coordination as Co-Chair of the IASC Reference Group since 2017, playing a key role in developing global guidance, training tools, and establishing and running surge mechanisms. He is also the director of WHO's "Build Better Before" global field-based full scale MHPSS simulation initiative an immersive preparedness exercise that has trained over 300 humanitarian and development professionals across six regions. Dr Hanna contributed to WHO's technical response to COVID-19, Ebola, Mpox, and Zika. His work reflects a deep commitment to equity, innovation, and mental health integration in global health security



Dr Hanna Kaade

Health Advisor (Consultant), German Red Cross

Hanna Kaade is a Syrian-German medical doctor based in Berlin, specialized in general surgery and emergency medicine. He also serves as a guest researcher at Brandenburg Medical University. After completing the first part of his surgical residency in Aleppo, Syria, he relocated to Germany in 2016.

With over a decade of volunteer experience with the Syrian Arab Red Crescent and professional work with the World Health Organization in Syria, Dr. Kaade has developed a strong passion for humanitarian health and its impact on fragile health systems.

In addition to his clinical work in hospitals, he works with the German Red Cross as an international delegate and health advisor, focusing on clinical and public health, as well as emergency response. As the focal point for Health Care in Danger, he advocates for the protection of health services in conflict zones. He also supports the World Health Organization's Emergency Medical Teams (EMT) Initiative as a mentor, helping build sustainable emergency care capacity in complex settings.

Currently, she works in the area of dementia and disaster management, collaborating with researchers and individuals with lived experience from Germany, Chile, and New Zealand. She also actively contributes to the WHO's global dementia dialogue on implementing the Blueprint for Dementia Research (2022). As a member of Interdem, a European initiative on societal perspectives of dementia, and an active participant in the Global Health Hub Germany since 2020, she promotes international dialogue between science, politics, and society to improve the lives of people with dementia worldwide. Born in East Berlin, she was the first in her family to pursue higher education and a scientific career. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, she emphasizes the importance of considering dementia in global crises like climate change and humanitarian disasters, striving to ensure no one is left behind on an international scale.

She also co-chairs The Lancet One Health Commission together with Prof. Dr. John Amuasi, KNUST, Kumasi, Ghana.

The Hub Community on Epidemic Preparedness and Response (EPR) is

dedicated to strengthening preparedness and response for infectious disease outbreaks/epidemics through multidisciplinary contributions to the development and implementation of feasible, user-friendly and potentially costeffectiveness public health applications.

A validated machine learning-based tool, namely, EWARS-csd (Early Warning and Response System for climate sensitive diseases) is the prime approach proposed for guiding the prediction-and-response of climate sensitive disease outbreaks such as malaria, dengue fever, cholera, meningitis and others. EPR closely interacts with two WHO departments in Geneva and a range of cross-continent countries, providing regular training and feed-back sessions.

A universal fact sheet and a policy brief of EWARS-csd was co-produced with support from the GHHG, and more recently district-specific weekly bulletins with information from the EWARS dashboards were developed and tested, to operationalize technical and statistical information for routine use for skilled and unskilled users.

The EPR community offers novel opportunities to enhance local capacity and decision making and provides know-how for implementation strategies including experience sharing from multiple settings and contexts.

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The interdisciplinary and intersectoral **Hub Community on snakebite envenoming** unites German expertise on snakebite envenoming and invites all interested parties to form partnerships and cooperate on projects.

Snakebite envenoming is classified by the WHO as a neglected tropical disease, affecting more than 5.4 million people each year, mainly in (sub)tropical and rural areas around the world. In terms of numbers, snakebite results in more than 100,000 deaths and over half a million amputations and other permanent disabilities per year. It impacts not only the individual victim, but entire families and their communities through lifelong mutilations, economic and mental health consequences. Although snakebite envenoming can be diagnosed and treated quickly and cost-effectively, most people worldwide have no access to this lifeand limb-saving treatment. This is why the interdisciplinary and intersectoral Hub Community on snakebite envenoming has been established. It consists of members from several leading German and international partner institutions as well as from civil society who are active in the field of snakebite and venom research. These include, beside many others, the Bernhard Nocht Institute for Tropical Medicine, the Fraunhofer Society and universities across the country.

Through this network, we aim to raise awareness of snakebites and their consequences, which are tragically part of everyday life in many regions of the world. Furthermore, we want to provide medical and scientific answers to questions that have remained unanswered until now.

The Hub Community on Global Urban Health focuses on the urban determinants of health, including spatial, social and economic disparities. Our vision is that urban spaces can be transformed into health-promoting, sustainable spaces that not only support the health of urban populations, but also contribute to climate change mitigation. In our first Policy Brief (2023), we highlighted the need for intersectoral collaboration for health in urban planning and urban development, i.e. calling for "Health In All Policies" at the urban level. Structural prevention is key in the urban context, as only if the urban environment is conducive to healthy behavior can a city become healthpromoting, "make the healthy choice the easy choice". In our Community, we recognize the small-scale inequities that persist in all urban areas. While some neighborhoods are already providing many urban benefits others are still suffering from urban disadvantage. For this reason, our community is working towards "City Diagnosis", as each individual city must first understand what areas are lacking and what opportunities exist. Only then can effective interventions be developed and implemented. Following our extensive Seminar Series, the community is now working on a guidance document on how to implement City Diagnosis.

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Community on Pandemic Prevention and Biosecurity

With new infectious disease outbreaks on the horizon, a layered and holistic approach to pandemic prevention and preparedness is urgently needed. To guard against both natural and man-made pandemics, the German government must strengthen public health systems and increase investments in biosafety and biosecurity. The Community on Pandemic Prevention and Biosecurity wants to raise awareness for these topics, foster synergies by connecting actors from the Global Health and Biosecurity communities, and develop policy suggestions for relevant stakeholders in Germany. By integrating these elements, the Community seeks to drive sustainable change for effective pandemic prevention.

For example, the Community has focussed on the role of indoor air quality in the transmission of airborne diseases. In a policy brief, they outline key recommendations for improving indoor air quality in Germany [Link: https://www.globalhealthhub.de/en/news/detail/breathe-better-and-prevent-pandemics-by-enhancing-indoor-air-quality]. The Community also presented them to the Commission on Indoor Air Quality of the Federal Environment Protection Agency (Umweltbundesamt – UBA).
